Since October 1, 2001 to April 30, 2011, (the effective dates of this report), **9,194** families have stayed one or more nights at our Kiwanis Family House while being treated at UCDMC.

This report covers over eight *years*. Previous to October 1, 2001 the reports were tabulated in a different format.

The Kiwanis Family House in conjunction with the Kiwanis Club of

Woodland has been selected to furnish volunteers to staff a special event for 2,500 employees of the Cache Creek Casino and their



families. The main event will run on Wednesday, June 29, 2011, at the Yolo County Fairgrounds Office, 1125 East Street Woodland, CA 95776. Phone: 530-402-2222.

The Fun Events Company has been contracted by the casino to put on this all day even, who, in turn, will depend on us to provide all of the staffing. We are looking for Kiwanians, Key Clubbers, Circle K members, and others who want to have as much fun as a volunteer can have plus helping the Kiwanis Family House earn money. Anyone, who is 14 years and older, can be a volunteer. Please note that our volunteers may not take children younger than 14 to the event under any circumstances. The Kiwanis Family House will receive \$5500 for our participation while we have a blast being a part of this action!

We will staff to operate seven midway games and twenty fun attractions, serve cotton candy, snowcones, churros, and ice cream. Many of us will be cooks and food service volunteers for a large variety of food items as well.

The main event will run on Wednesday, June 29th from 8:45am to 8:15pm to provide coverage time for three casino employee shifts.

A total of 135 volunteer positions are required to be filled for three days. Volunteers may choose to do more than one day:

Tuesday, June 28th, 12noon - 3:00pm: 30 volunteers (5 must be adults over age of 18) to set up events and activities.

Wednesday, June 29th, 7:30am - 8:45am: 15 volunteers (3 must be adults over age of 18) to set up events and activities.

other Kiwanians.

In the beginning, before there was a Kiwanis Family House, George related that his club visited the Kiwanis Club of Southeast Sacramento, with an interclub.

(KFH Founder) Vern Bright was a member of that SE Sacramento Club. Vern told George that his club was going to take the project on. George told Vern that he thought they would need help from other clubs for such an ambitious undertaking. George was right, and soon after Divisions 7 and 44 got involved. Gary Christensen up-dated George by informing him that now there are about 90 Clubs supporting the Family House.

According to George, a contractor that had just finished a construction project, offered them five surplus construction trailers. The asking price for the trailers was \$19,000. A member of the S.E. Sacramento Club advanced the money to purchase them and was later repaid.

The UC Davis Hospital provided a place for the Kiwanis Family House at 48th and V Streets, which at that time was surrounded by vacant land. The trailers were moved to the site at no cost by a then anonymous trailer transporter from Woodland.

A memorable event when he was President of the Board was when he was able to give past District Governor Frank Souza and the Governor at that time (Wayne W. Hoeft O.D.) a tour of our Family House. Since George was also a docent at the California State Railroad Museum, he gave them a tour of that facility as well.

George has had some health issues dating back to before our new Family House was built in 2006 and has only viewed the outside on a drive-by visit. The Woodland Kiwanis Club hopes to get him and his electric scooter inside to get a look at the



rest of the Kiwanis Family House soon. At a recent Division 44 Council Meeting KFH President Rick Dwyer presented a Bright Award to Chris Creel-



man.

Rick listed the contributions of Chris. Not only is he a "regular" at the ARCO service project, he chairs the Creelman-Francisco Golf Classic. held on the last Thursday of April. This golf tournament is the oldest continuously operating charity golf tournament in all of Kiwanis Interna-

A bit of history, the first Division 7 tournament was held in 1960. Chris' dad, Bob Creelman took over this tournament in 1962 or 1963. He ran the Tournament until 1977 when he died of Cancer. In 1978, Wilford "Red" Francisco, of Davis became the Tournament Director. The event was re-named the Creelman Classic.

Red continued as Tournament Director until approximately 1998. Chris then became the Tournament Director. Sacramento-. Suburban became a Sponsoring Club along with East-Sac Midtown, Davis and Citrus Heights. Red died of Cancer in 2004 and the tournament was re-named the Creelman-Francisco Classic starting in 2005.

The named charities that were beneficiaries varied, but our KFH became one. In all, over the years our KFH received approximately \$55,000. The 2011 event netted approximately \$6,700.

Chris responded: "It was a hell of a surprise and a great honor, having known the Brights since I was a kid when my father followed Vern through the Lt. Gov. Chairs of Division 7 in the early 70s.

"I just wish I could share the award with my great committee of Tim Reid of Davis; Bob Lutz of Citrus Heights; Mike Flynn of East Sacramento-Midtown; and Tom Fleischman of my club. The Classic certainly wouldn't run as smoothly and be as successful without all their great help."

Forrest Mars invented the recipe for M&Ms chocolate during the Spanish Civil War.

Mars saw soldiers eating pieces of chocolate covered with a hard sugary coating. The coating prevented the candy from melting in the hot sun.

Forrest Mars received a patent for his manufacturing process on March 3, 1941. Production began in 1941 in a factory located at.

One *M* was for Forrest E. Mars **Sr.**, and the other *M* one for **Bruce** Murrie, the son of Hershey's Chocolate president William F. R. Murrie. The letter "m" is printed on each candy with vegetable dye.

The arrangement allowed the candies to be made with Hershey chocolate which had control of the then rationed chocolate.

Our Kiwanis Family House was recently blessed with a visit from Ellen Ashbaugh (Kiwanis Club of Greater Lodi). She came loaded with quilts from the Rag Quilters.

The Rag Quilters have made 92 blankets in the past four weeks after giving 15 to Lodi House, 15 to Touro Medical School in Las Vegas (my future daughter in law is a medical student there), the remaining were donated to our KFH.

As for Ellen Ashbaugh in her own words: "I joined Kiwanis in 1996 in Medford, Oregon.....didn't have much of a choice for a service club, since with my father being a charter member of the Kiwanis Club of Greater Lodi, who also had 55 years perfect attendance when he died in 2008.

"In 2003-2004, I served as president of my club in Oregon, then as Division 82 Lt. Governor, in 2004-2005.

"I was also honored to serve on the Pacific Northwest (PNW) District Fi-



nance committee and the PNW Foundation Board of Directors. One of my greatest Kiwanis memories was serving as a Sergeant Of Arms backstage at the 2005 St. Louis Kiwanis International Convention and having a rather flustered International Trustee, Lennie Simmons ask me to 'take care of his brother'.....for those of you attending the convention, you know that his brother is entertainer, Richard Simmons.

"Good thing I wore shoes I could run in, because he definitely kept me moving that day.

"Our current International President, Sylvester Neal was our PNW Governor that year and an incredible individual to know.

"As for some stuff on the Rag Quilters...... Diane Nantt, the owner of Quilters Friend Quilt Shop in Lodi had agreed to let me advertise for a quilting group after seeing I For each lap, the walker has a score the quilts that several of us were making for some foster kids in the local community.

"After seeing that we were hand cutting the fringe on the guilts, she offered her cutting equipment and shop for us to use to make more quilts.....a long story short, we now provide free kits to hand out at the shop, meet six times a year to sew

together, now have group of over 25 quilters that have made over 1,155 blankets for pediatric trauma in our community.

"All of this has happened in the past two years, of which the Kiwanis Club has now sponsored for about a year and a half. The blankets are donated to the local California Highway Patrol, San Joaquin County Sheriff's Department, Lodi Police and Fire Departments, Kiwanis Family House, Lodi House, the Children's Advocacy Center, and the Women's Center to name a few. The quilters are my heroes!!!!!!"

"After relocating home to Lodi, I immediately joined the Greater Lodi club and the rest is history. I have been married to my husband, Alan (a Lodi Lions Club member) for 38 years and have a married daughter, Kristen and a son, Jonathan, a Captain in the U. S. Army. My Oregon club also honored me with a Hixson Award in October, 1998."



UC Davis Children's Hospital is among the nation's best children's hospitals, according to a ranking released May 17, 2011 by *U.S. News and World Report.*

The publication's pediatrics rankings were published on its website and will appear in the *Best Hospitals* print guide, available on newsstands Aug. 30.

"This recognition is a testament to the quality and compassion of

the UC Davis Children's Hospital staff — the doctors, nurses, technicians and others who provide the very best care for children in the Sacramento region and beyond," said Ann



Madden Rice, chief executive officer, UC Davis Medical Center.

This year, U.S. News evaluated 170 pediatric centers and ranked 50 top children's hospitals nationwide in 10 categories: cancer, diabetes and endocrinology, gastroenterology, heart and heart surgery, kidney disorders, neonatology, neurology and neurosurgery, orthopaedics, pulmonology and urology. UC Davis Children's Hospital is ranked 36th in pediatric urology.

"This honor recognizes the pediat-

ric urology program's reputation for excellence in urogenital reconstructive surgery and our commitment to caring for children throughout Northern California and Ne-



vada, " said Eric Kurzrock M.D, associate professor and chief of pediatric urology. Kurzrock also is a member of the medical staff of Shriners Hospitals for Children Northern California.

Pediatric urologists care for infants and children with urogenital conditions. In addition to treating patients, Kurzrock is a surgeonscientist who conducts research using human bladder stem cells to improve treatments for children with bladder disorders and adults with bladder cancer.

For the 2010-11 rankings, U.S. News requested data from 170 pediatric centers and used survey results from thousands of physicians in 10 pediatric specialties who were asked where they would refer the sickest patients. In all, 62 hospitals ranked in at least one specialty.

UC Davis Children's Hospital is the Sacramento region's only comprehensive hospital for children, serving infants, children, adolescents and young adults with primary, subspecialty and critical-care services. It includes the Central Valley's only pediatric emergency department and level I pediatric trauma center, which offers the highest level of care for critically ill children. The 110-bed "hospital within a hospital" includes a 49-bed, state-of-the-art neonatal intensive care unit and a 16-bed pediatric intensive care unit. With more than 120 physicians in 33 subspecialties, UC Davis Children's Hospital has more than 74,000 clinic and hospital visits and 13,000 emergency department visits each year. (Continued from page 1) of 2005, actual construction costs had escalated almost \$1,000,000. It was a miracle we could stay within our budget because of the donations, contributions, and Rods negotiating skills.

During this budgeting process I had prepared a loan package to submit to lenders in the Sacramento area. There was not one bank that would entertain a loan for us. We were going to build a single purpose building and we could not provide any personal guarantees for the construction loan. This is a deadly combination for commercial financing. Any of you in the construction financing business know what I mean.

During the early years of my term, Gary and I were on the convention circuit with our KFH booth, getting Kiwanians from all states and clubs exposed to our mission and requesting financial support.

I give credit to prior President, Loring Turrell and Secretary Lanelle Rogers who initiated and supported the need for KFH to expose its Mission to the Kiwanis world. All I did was to continue and follow their leadership. While at one of these meeting, likely the district convention or a Mid-Year Conference, Gary





Bay Area, who was running as a candidate for Cal-Nev-Ha District Governor. We related our need for a lender for construction and permanent financing to build the new KFH House.

She recommended a loan office that had worked for her, **Margaret Lowel!**. After convention I talked with and met Margaret and submitted our loan package. After this 18 month long marathon effort and three employer banks later, following many, many meetings with her loan committee's and numerous turn downs, Margaret struck pay dirt.

A new senior banker had been transferred to her branch and he had some \$5,000,000 in loan signing authority and was a Key Club President in high school. He knew about our **Kiwanis Family House**, its Mission, and the Mission of Kiwanis International. He had no trouble signing off on this loan without ever visiting the site until after construction. Another miracle witnessed.

What do you think the odds are of this ever happening again? It goes to show that a lot of Kiwanis perseverance and talent, coupled with prayer and belief in a mission can result in miracles.

I consider this result the most significant in my Kiwanis life. It has been a pleasure for me to represent our **Kiwanis Family House** in our community these past few years, one child at a time.

Thank you all for supporting our mission. It has been a pleasure to know each and everyone of you. After a short break I will be back working with Gary to support and work for the \$\$\$ needed to continue our Mission. Till next time.....
